The Colorado River is "oversubscribed," meaning that those who have water rights are withdrawing more water than the river can provide. Tribes and States are disputing Colorado River water allocation. People living on the Navajo Nation use an average of 10 gallons per day, less than 1/10th the average US usage; many Navajo lack clean water and must haul it from distant sources. The play is on in Washington, D.C. at the Mosaic theater company from March 28 to April 21: It's 1985 in Washington, DC and two women are trying to steer their futures—Nancy Reagan from the White House, orchestrating her husband "Ronnie's" political career according to daily astrological trends, and Esmeralda, a Navajo mother advocating for her

community. Their worlds converge over an unbelievable discovery—Nancy has a direct familial connection to Pocahontas.

Opportunities to Partner

The BYM Indigenous Affairs Committee is developing a proposal on reparations from BYM to the Pawnee Nation. BYM Friends contributed to harming the Pawnee when they participated in practices of cultural assimilation in a school they established at the Pawnee agency. The school and its Quaker administrators intentionally promoted English and suppressed the Pawnee language, causing cultural destruction and intergenerational trauma. We are and will continue to work with other BYM groups as we proceed on this journey.

The Nisenan Tribe plans to purchase 232 acres of land that once belonged to their tribe and is now in Quaker hands (the site of the Wooman School). The current owners have entered into an escrow agreement with the Tribe. Funds are still needed to help the Tribe get the property up to code and make the land ready for their use.
